<b>Chivas Regal 25 Year Old</b> Originally blended for the New York, High Society market in 1909, war & prohibition took the appeal out of the original expression. Now it is reborn with each whisky in the blend aged for at least 25 years and the combination of them is a testament to the quality of the Chivas' ageing and refined stock. Apricot & peach notes throughout, a warm fruity aroma & a nutty, chocolate & orange palate. It is arguably the ultimate in smooth & balanced blended whisky with an astonishing rounded finish	43%	£38.00
<b>The Famous Grouse, Vintage Malt Whisky 1992</b>	40%	£8.00
<b>Johnnie Walker Red Label</b> Noted for its pungent aroma and smoky character. The addition of Talisker as a keynote malt is evidenced by Red Labels ability to retain its power and remain undiminished by careful mixing or similarly, to be enjoyed straight. The whisky has an excellent roundness and length. Soft peaty finish. A benchmark for blended Scotch Whisky.	40%	£5.00

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## THE LAMB AT HINDON

### A guide to the Scotch whisky regions

Like wines, the single malts of Scotland are grouped by region although these regions offer a guideline rather than a rule. The regions of Scotland – the Lowlands, the Highlands, Campbeltown and the island of Islay – have their origins in the regulation of licences and duties, but they do also embrace certain characteristics.

#### **The Lowlands**

This area tends to produce softer malts, without the peat of the Highlands or the brininess of the coastal malts. The Lowlands is defined by a line following old county boundaries and running from the Clyde estuary to the River Tay. The line swings north of Glasgow and Dumbarton and runs to Dundee and Perth.

#### **The Highlands, Islands and Speyside**

By far the largest region, the Highlands embraces wide variations in style. The western Highlands have only a few scattered distilleries, and it is difficult to generalise about their character. If they have anything in common, it is a rounded, firm, dry character, with some peatiness. The far north of the Highlands has several whiskies with a notably heathery, spicy, character, probably deriving both from the local soil and the coastal location of the distilleries. The more sheltered East Highlands and the Midlands of Scotland (sometimes described as the South Highlands) have a number of notably fruity whiskies.

None of these Highland areas is officially regarded as a region, but the area between them, known as Speyside, is universally acknowledged as the heartland of malt distillation. This area, between the cities of Inverness and Aberdeen, sweeps from Granite Mountains down to fertile countryside, where barley is among the crops. It is the watershed of a system of rivers, the principal among which is the Spey. Although it is not precisely defined, Speyside is commonly agreed to extend at least from the River Findhorn in the west to the Deveron in the east. Within this region are several other rivers, notably the Livet.

The Speyside single malts are noted in general for their elegance and complexity, and often a refined smokiness. Beyond that, they have two extremes: the big, sherryish type, as typified by The Macallan, Glenfarclas and Aberlour; and the lighter, more subtle style. Within Speyside, the River Livet is so famous that its name is borrowed by some whiskies from far beyond its glen.

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Only one may call itself The Glenlivet, only Braes of Glenlivet and Tamnavulin are produced in the valley, and only Tomintoul in the parish. These are all delicate malts, and it could be more tentatively argued that other valleys have malts that share certain characteristics. The Highland region includes a good few coastal and island malts, but one peninsula and just one island have been of such historical importance in the industry that they are each regarded as being regions in their own right.

### **Campbeltown**

On the peninsula called the Mull of Kintyre, on the west coast of Scotland, Campbeltown once had about 30 distilleries. Today, it has only two. One of these, Springbank, produces two different single malts. This apparent contradiction is achieved by the use of a lightly peated malt in one and a smokier kilning in the other. The Campbeltown single malts are very distinctive, with a briny character. Although there are only three of them, they are still considered by serious malt lovers to represent a region in their own right.

### **Islay**

Pronounced "eye-luh", this is the greatest of whisky islands: much of it deep with peat, lashed by the wind, rain and sea in the Inner Hebrides. It is only 25 miles long, but has no fewer than eight distilleries, although not all are working. Its single malts are noted for their seaweedy, iodine-like, phenolic character. A dash of Islay malt gives the unmistakable tang of Scotland to many blended whiskies.

### **Tasting notes**

We have included a brief tasting note for each of the many single malt whiskies on our list which we hope will prove useful to both novice and seasoned drinkers. By their nature, tasting notes are always subjective and so you may not agree with what we say! We are indebted to the many different sources that have provided these notes, not least *www.whisky-world.com* which provides a wealth of information for the whisky enthusiast. We are lacking a few notes – so all submissions are welcome.

<b>Aberlour 10yrs</b> <i>Speyside, distillery bottling</i> Nutty, with nutmeg and a hint of cinnamon. Although peated it is very brandy-like and warming. Not overly challenging but quite satisfying, particularly with dessert.	40%	£7.20
<b>Ardbeg 10yrs</b> <i>Islay, distillery bottling</i> The nose is amazingly smoky with a whiff of tar-covered rope. The palate is robust with more peat smoke and the flavours of turf and lapsang souchong. A long finish with a fragrant peaty reek. Whilst flavour-packed this is still a delicate scotch.	46%	£10.30
<b>Balblair 10yrs</b> <i>Northern Highlands, bottled by Gordon &amp; MacPhail</i> Light bodied and golden with a slightly medicinal nose.	40%	£7.80
<b>Balvenie 12yrs Doublewood</b> <i>A smooth and mellow single malt of beautifully combined flavours - nutty sweetness, cinnamon spiciness and a delicately proportioned layer of sherry - with a long and warming finish</i>	43%	£8.70
<b>Balvenie 21yrs</b> An additional period of maturation in 30 year-old port pipes has given this aged Balvenie an extra level of depth and concentration of flavour, adding potent fruit and smoke notes to the silky smooth palate. Rich, indulgent, after-dinner Speyside at its best	43%	£22.50
<b>Benromach organic</b> <i>Produced using the finest organic ingredients, matured in oak casks. This results in a rich, fruity musky flavour</i>	43%	£9.50
<b>Bladnoch 10yrs</b> <i>Lowlands, distillery bottling</i> Light to medium bodied with a fragrant, lemony aroma and a gentle, unassertive flavour with fruity tones.	43%	£11.50
<b>Bowmore Darkest 15 yrs</b> <i>Islay, distillery bottling</i> The sherry aroma is fantastic, together with almonds and mature oak. The peaty notes become an excellent foil to the fruity flavours and do not allow the sherry to totally dominate. Hints of the sea drift in given a little time in the glass. Soft over ripe dark grapes flood the palate like an incoming tide. It's rich, but not over the top, due to the wonderful heather fire smoky flavour you will find on the back palate. 	Lots of honeysuckle, myrtle, green apple and soft pear nose with no heavy peat reek to mask its zest. Simple and succulent with the sweet flavours of home-made fudge, toasted malt and mead. Like a Scottish Reel it is full of action, not too long and takes your breath away.

	<i>Islay, distillery bottling</i>		
	<i>The first impression is of drifting smoke, which passes, to be replaced by clean, fruit-associated scents of nectarines, rum-toft and oil of orange. Delicate, drying and mouth-cooling, the overall effect is refreshing. This comes from a distinct minty-toffee flavour, with some smoke in the finish.</i>

	<i>(Pronounced cull-eela, gaelic for "Sound of Islay")</i>		
	<i>Juniper and garden mint on the nose with burnt grass, but soft and lightly oily. Soothing at first with lots of flavour development and a spicy (nutmeg, pepper)and very long finish.</i>		
	<b>Clynelish 14yrs</b>	43%	£9.30
	<i>Northern Highlands, distillery bottling</i>		
	Fruit cake and vanilla creme anglaise with a waft of smoke on the nose and a fruity finish.		
	<b>Cragganmore 12yrs</b>	40%	£10.80
	<i>Speyside, distillery bottling</i>		
	Intense It, nearly overwhelmingly, perfumed, especially with a splash of water. Very herbal and aromatic, the palate is dry and reminiscent of a very dry white wine. Exquisitely balanced, it is great as an aperitif, but complex enough to be enjoyed long after dinner.

	<b>Dalmore 12yrs</b>	40%	£6.80
	<i>Northern Highlands, distillery bottling</i>		
	Beautiful balance of tempting aromas. Gently fragrant peat-smoke. Orange marmalade, malt and sherry. Very complex with wonderfully combined flavours.		
	<b>'Deerstalker', Balmenach 12yrs</b>	46%	£7.50
	<i>Speyside, distillery bottling</i>		
	A complicated, full-bodied malt, best suited as an after-dinner dram.		
	<b>Edradour 10yrs</b>	40%	£9.80
	<i>Southern Highlands, distillery bottling</i>		
	Sherried, butterscotch and vanilla nose. Honeyed and creamy with dried fruits and minty spice on the palate.		
	<b>Glen Garioch 21yrs</b>	43%	£12.00
	<i>Eastern Highlands, distillery bottling</i>		
	Sun-scorched grass with a hint of peat on the nose. Surprisingly fat flavours with sweet, clean, cereal grain maltiness which develop minty notes. A strong finish with some phenol and a slight bitterness. A reminder that a distillery with its own maltings gains a layer of character.		
	<b>Glen Grant 10yrs</b>	40%	£7.20
	<i>Speyside, distillery bottling</i>		
	A malty and sweet nose which notably improves after a little breathing. Sherry sweetness on the palate this is a pleasant but undemanding whisky.

	A whiff of peat, a hint of leather and straw – the taste is dry with pepper and a sweet spiciness like humbugs. With water there is more creaminess, followed by a pleasant, dry grapey tang. The finish leaves a dry tang of fruit skins.

	<i>Northern Highlands, distillery bottling</i>

	<i>Speyside, distillery bottling</i>		
	Amber gold in colour offering delightful fruit, oak and sweet sensations, with a long and flavoursome finish		
	<b>Glenfarclas 105°</b>	60%	£11.80

	A very 'loud' and powerful bouquet with red cabbage, toffee and a hint of peppermint after dilution. Too overpowering at 60% neat – a touch of water is certainly required.

	<i>Speyside, distillery bottling</i>		
	Honeyed vanilla, apple pie and custard aromas. Dry on the palate with nutmeg and dark chocolate strains and a hint of light, oaky, smoke.

	<i>Speyside, distillery bottling</i>		
	Dark amber in colour this is a pungent, aged, spirit with overtones of oak and a hint of sherry on the nose. The flavour is big and dry but the finish is long and smooth.

	<i>Speyside, distillery bottling</i>		
	A fresh nose of dried fruits and vanilla. The palate is creamy with malt, fruit cake and a touch of peat and honey leading to a biscuity, malty finish.

	<i>Speyside, distillery bottling</i>		
	A more sprightly Glenfiddich than the standard 12. Thirst-quenching, sweet, malty and lightly fruity. A slight woody catch on the tongue then the smoke builds up.		

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	<b>Glenfiddich 15yrs,</b> <i>Speyside, distillery bottling</i> Glenfiddich maltiness perfectly balanced by delicate spice and honey. Medium length, with sherry notes and spiciness which is effortlessly balanced by drier oakiness.	40%	£10.30

	<b>Glenmorangie 10yrs</b> <i>Northern Highlands, distillery bottling</i> Walnuts, vanilla, green herbs and some flowery sweetness on the nose with a herbal, salty, palate. The finish is amazingly long, drying from the initial sweetness but with flaked almonds amid the oakier notes.	40%	£9.80
	<b>Glenmorangie – Madeira Wood</b> <i>Northern Highlands, distillery bottling</i> Fresh and lively bouquet with grassy, oaky, vanilla notes and salty extremes. Teasing sweet and sour balance of nuts and raisins, chocolate orange and brine with a very warming finish. Still teasingly raisiny until a faintly peaty dryness finally prevails.	40%	£14.50
